Dear Christ the King Parents,

We hope this message finds you and your loved ones safe and healthy, as we look forward to seeing you during pick up next week. It is surreal to realize our Crusaders have been physically apart since March 11, rendering our campus so quiet at a time it would otherwise be the vibrant place of learning and physical community that means so much to us. We were all thrown into something unexpected, requiring us to make major adjustments to protect public health in the face of this novel pandemic. This has not been an easy transition, and we thank all of you for your understanding and steadfast sense of community that we were on this journey together.

In times such as these, it is important to remember that God is with us and continues to guide our path. We are reminded of the Road to Emmaus passage from Luke's Gospel: "Now that very day two of them were going to a village seven miles from Jerusalem called Emmaus, and they were conversing about all the things that had occurred. And it happened that while they were conversing and debating, Jesus himself drew near and walked with them, but their eyes were prevented from recognizing him. He asked them, 'What are you discussing as you walk along?' They stopped, looking downcast. One of them, named Cleopas, said to him in reply, 'Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know of the things that have taken place there in these days?' And he replied to them, 'What sort of things?'" As the Gospel continues the apostles ask Jesus to stay with them and in these trying times we must invite Jesus to continue to walk with us on the journey ahead.
